Former Northeast Wisconsin resident Ruth Tweeten will appear at Shepherd of the Bay in a concert of solo organ music on Sunday evening, July 25th at 7 o'clock. Having played recitals on the East and West Coasts, in the Midwest, Canada, and Europe, Ms Tweeten returns to a part of our state she called home for many years, when she was University Organist and Organ Instructor at the University of Wisconsin in Green Bay for 12 years and organist at Bethel Lutheran Church. Most recently, Ruth has served as Organist and Director of Music at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Davenport, Iowa. Ruth's concerts in the U.S. and abroad have been acclaimed for her virtuosity, wide range of music programmed, and "musically electrifying manner" of performance.

An alumna of St. Olaf College and the Longy School of Music in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Ruth completed graduate studies at Northwestern University. Her teachers have included Wolfgang Rübsam, John Ferris, David N. Johnson, and Anton Heiller (Vienna, Austria).

Ruth has performed at national conventions of the Organ Historical Society in Milwaukee, Iowa, St. Louis, New Jersey, Vermont, and Chicago. In Europe she was invited to play in Lübeck, Brandenburg, and Leipzig in Germany, and she was featured in the Vienna Summer Music Festival. Radio broadcasts of her concerts have been aired on Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Boston Public Radio, and the ÖRF in Austria.

Join us for an evening of classical organ music as we welcome Ruth Tweeten back to Wisconsin for her appearance in Door County, featuring the church's Dobson pipe organ, Opus 79 (2004). The public is invited. There is no admission charge. A free-will offering will be taken to benefit the special music fund. All are invited to a reception following the concert to greet Ms. Tweeten.

FILLING AN AGE OLD PRESCRIPTION

If Hippocrates (who has been dead since 377 B.C.) could see us now, he would probably be saying...

“WHY DIDN’T YOU LISTEN TO MY PRESCRIPTION?”

It was Hippocrates who said, “Walking is man’s best medicine”. His magic pill/cure-all for everything that ails you is the simple act of putting one foot in front of the other. God - in His infinite wisdom - created our bodies for walking. Man, however continually looks for ways to avoid having to do it! Our bodies were designed to walk, but instead we park as close as we can to work or stores; we ride escalators and elevators, and we wish our newspapers were thrown closer to the door. It’s been more than 2,300 years since the death of Hippocrates, and people still aren’t taking his walking prescription. What was good medicine back then is still good medicine today. Modern studies show that walking 30 minutes a day reduces the risk of heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes and other ailments. Walking has also been shown to reduce anxiety, irritability, tension and sleeplessness. Yes, Hippocrates may have had more time for walking. We’re constantly rushing off to meetings, lessons, games or other events. Time is valuable, but so is OUR HEALTH. We need to be in good shape physically and mentally to be able to perform the tasks God has placed before us. Perhaps it’s time we took an old doctor’s advice and find ways to fit walking into our schedule. If we don’t make our health a priority, who will??

ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY

BRIDGES, the summer program for the international students working in Door County has started its 14th year with our first two events, on May 25 with a volleyball and basketball evening and on June 22 a cruise on the bay. Nine more bi-weekly events are planned through October 5.

There is little to do in the evening in Door County for our foreign friends, and there is no public transportation, so originally this program was conceived as a way to show friendship to the international summer workers by organizing social events with a meal, and loaning bicycles. Next ESL classes were added, and friendships were encouraged between Americans and internationals. Last year we added I-GIG discussions, an "International Group Investigating God." Some students come with an interest in religion, probing questions, and many misconceptions about Christianity.

Probably one of the most rewarding aspects of BRIDGES is The American Connection in which an international student is paired with an American family. This becomes a rewarding friendship in which both parties learn about different cultural approaches to everyday experiences. You discover that deep down, people all over the world are much like us, with the same longings for love, acceptance and belonging. Many long-term friendships have resulted from these relationships. It is our hope that many people will avail themselves of this opportunity to show American kindness and Christian love to the strangers among us.

Without public transportation in Door County, it is difficult for the internationals to travel very far from their place of employment or home base. The Lions Club of Sister Bay is managing the bicycle loaning program this year. Clint Robison reports that they have already serviced half of the 123 bikes in the fleet and that it has been a good experience for them. The students are very appreciative of having a bike.

It's exciting to see how the four sponsoring churches are working together collaboratively and effectively. BRIDGES appreciates the help and support of Shepherd of the Bay in making this ministry possible. It takes many people to cover all the bases in this program. Report from Shepherd of the Bay Youth on their week at Pine Ridge Reservation

We live in a world that is constantly telling us we need more: more money, more popularity, more stuff. But what do we really need more of? And what do we need less of? Jesus asks us to have less “me” things: less fear, less here-and-now rewards, and less ego. Sometimes we even need to do less, so that we can have a better relationship with Jesus. When we worry less about “me” and instead focus on Jesus, we get more: more courage, more time to be in a relationship with God, and more ability to love others.

This past week, we had the chance to pursue that one thing we all need in our lives: more Jesus. On Friday, June 18th, ten teens and our two adult leaders, Dick and Jane Burress began a life changing experience. We served for one week on the Pine Ridge Reservation in southwestern South Dakota, where the unemployment rate is 87% and the average family income is just \$3,700 per year. This area is the second most impoverished place in the country. Throughout the week, we served in the community by painting houses, tutoring children, and playing with them in Children’s Club. We built so many relationships in the short time we spent with the Lakota people. Thinking back on the trip, some images that come to mind are the bright smiles on the faces of the children we tutored and played with, sitting next to a man named Shoulders at a community cookout while he was telling us about the lessons he has learned from the mistakes he has made in life, and seeing the differences the twelve of us made in the homes of community members.

But most importantly, all of these experiences together helped each and every one of us form a stronger relationship with God. Serving as the hands of God has been a truly awesome experience that we are all very thankful for. We would just like to thank all of you for supporting us and giving us this awesome opportunity.



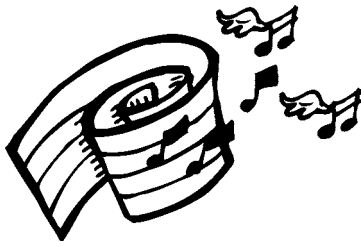
