## What's your favorite hymn?

I don't know if I have a favorite; I have a list of them that I might call favorites. Several of them are on that list because of connections they have to significant moments in my life.

In the church of my childhood, one we sang often was "Abide with Me." The text draws on Jesus' language in John 15, where Jesus tells his disciples to abide in him. It's a song about God accompanying us through adversity, "when comforts flee," as a "help of the helpless." I was a young singer who was mesmerized by singing in harmony. I learned how to read the notes in the hymnal, and the easy bass line gave me an opportunity to become that person that I admired so much — the one who added harmony to the beautiful melody. Of all the beautiful poetry of this hymn, my mind always settles on this line: "Hold thou thy cross before my closing eyes; shine through the gloom and point me to the skies. Heav'ns morning breaks and earth's vain shadows flee. Oh, thou who changest not, abide with me."

"Abide" is a word we don't use; maybe it's because we aren't very practiced at abiding. Abiding is to stay with someone for the distance. Sticking by their side through ups and downs. That's how God is with us. God sticks by our side through thick and thin, and I would say especially in the moments when all else has failed.

God is faithful. God has promised to be with us.

As children of God created in God's image, we are called to do the same in our own way, accompanying each other through times of difficulty, being a help to the helpless, a voice for the voiceless. When I had my first knee surgery, our older son, Chris, drove up to be with me for a few days while Sheryl had to be at work. My needs were not great, and he did not have to do much care-giving. But to have him there, simply to be present so I didn't have to be alone in the uncertainty of recovery was such a comfort. We didn't do much, except talk some and work on a jigsaw puzzle. His presence was of enormous comfort. That's abiding.

Our ministry is like that: abiding with those who need someone to accompany them in life's challenges. Our food pantry abides with those who struggle to put food on their table. Our children's ministry abides with parents who look for help in raising their children to know and love Jesus. Our new Congregation Care Coordinator will ensure that we abide with our members who need our love and care during challenging circumstances. Through these ministries (and so many others!) we are, in effect, singing "Abide with Me," embodying "Abide with Me," incarnating the central message and hope of "Abide with Me": to accompany and help the helpless, the voiceless, the downtrodden, the lonely, the least of these, the ones living through adversity.

What kind of songs will we continue to sing and embody as a congregation? What new songs will we sing? How can we gather our generosity – our finances, our compassion, our vision, our values – and continue to live out our mission today?

On October 5, we'll launch our Fall Giving Campaign. The theme this year is "A Chorus of Generosity." Using this musical theme, we'll challenge each other and encourage each other to be generous in supporting the work we do in Christ's name.

And we're going to have some fun with this. Each week of our campaign, one of our members will share a favorite song and an encouragement to generosity. And we're going to ask you to nominate your favorite hymns. We'll tally the votes and on Celebration Sunday, October 19, we'll start the service with a hymn sing and make sure that we include all your favorites in that service. We'll also engage in a "30 Day Generosity Challenge," a fun way to practice generosity in our daily lives. You can find the Challenge on page 10 of this newsletter.



I can't wait to share this time with you, a time of inspiration, challenge, and encouragement. A time to celebrate our "Chorus of Generosity."

The past two years have been a time of conversation and listening. As a part of the Thriving Congregations initiative, together we have been listening to God in God's word, listening to each other, and listening to the community. In that time of holy, prayerful conversation, we have heard the clear voice of the Spirit calling us to pay attention to the way we care for each other. As a result of the listening that happened in the one on one meetings, listening sessions, data analysis, and the work of our research/action team, the Voice said, "Pay attention to how you care for each other, especially the senior members of your congregation."

To that end, it is with great joy that we announce the addition of a Congregation Care Coordinator to our staff. Meet Amy Hennings. Amy, her husband, Greg Canard, and their children, Dillon and Lila, are members of Shepherd of the Bay. Amy is a licensed clinical counselor with a Ph. D. in Psychology. She teaches at Alverno College in Milwaukee. Her vocational history includes serving as the clinical director for a therapeutic foster care agency and serving as the Casework Department Director for Catholic Charities in Chicago. She brings gifts of empathy, compassion, and strong organizational skills to make sure we do our best job in caring for our members with short and long term needs.

The position is part-time, allowing Dr. Hennings to continue her teaching responsibilities, and also providing us with an extraordinarily gifted person to shepherd our caring ministries. Thanks to be to God, to you, the members of Shepherd of the Bay, for participating in this process, and to Amy for answering the call to ministry.

My name is Amy Hennings, and I am honored to introduce myself as the new Congregation Care Coordinator at Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church.

My family and I relocated to the Ellison Bay/Gills Rock area in June 2023 and officially became members of Shepherd of the Bay in the fall of 2024. When I read Pastor Jim's newsletter about the creation of this new position, I felt a strong calling to respond. No matter what the language, love is universal. We make room for those we love in our lives, in our hearts, in our memories, in our hopes and dreams. We look for clones of ourselves, seeking "likenesses" of opinion, of social status, of educational background, rather than embracing "others" who might offer differing opinions, new insights, good arguments, helping the "scales" of long-held opinion to fall from our eyes through heartfelt dialogue and discussion.

John 15:12-17

Jesus speaking: "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.

No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.

You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer,

because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends,

because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.

## A Note from the Treasurer

## **Online Giving. A Great Option!**

Earlier this year, our database software service changed some of its service around online giving. We have made the adjustments to continue reporting your giving accurately. The switch may have resulted in some dates being slightly off. I anticipate some online givers will notice this in their giving statements, but it will not affect the sum total.

Consider using online giving if you aren't already. If you're not comfortable being online, ask Carol in the office for a form to begin regular online giving. OR- You can create your account by going to the Shepherd of the Bay website, <a href="mailto:shepherdofthebay.org">shepherdofthebay.org</a> and click on the Donate button in the upper right hand corner. Click on Give Now, and it takes you right to the Vanco site where you can establish an account. I recommend that you use a bank account instead of a credit card for the donation since credit cards regularly expire.

Also, remember that the qualified charitable rollover is a great way to satisfy the Required Minimum Distribution and make a gift to the church. Be sure to instruct your brokerage that you want your name listed as the donor. And if you're reading this and wondering, 'Huh?", well, you're too young!

The meeting was called to order by President Tara Torkelson at 7:17 PM in the home of Cheryl Becht.

A recommendation was made by Scott Henry that the draft minutes of the June 16, 2025 reflect consistency of the discussion regarding the Congregational Care Coordinator (formerly referred to as the Senior Care Coordinator). Minutes amended as suggested.

#### President Torkelson summarized the **Committee Reports**.

Outreach Report: 6 people volunteered to share the responsibilities of Klaud's Pantry upon Edee Madsen's departure. On Aug 19, 2025, we will be hosting a Bridges event and volunteers are needed. The Church Bus Ministry continues to be busy serving various needs including the Mission trip to North Carolina and Scandia residents wishing to attend Peninsula Music Festival. The Habitat/Housing Partnership home under construction is moving along quickly according to Tom Tuttle.

<u>Buildings and Grounds report:</u> Night lighting and music room storage are being reviewed. The previously discussed air conditioning has been installed. The security systems and WIFI continued to be evaluated. The stained glass window repairs are being evaluated.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Grace Rossman reviewed some of the items to be stated at the upcoming congregation meeting. Thank You notes were received from 2 scholarship winners.

<u>Youth and Family Report:</u> Lynda Pietruszka reported 9 people will be in the group for the upcoming mission trip.

#### New Business:

- 1. Jane Burress request was approved to use of the church property for Girl Scout activities once or twice per month in compliance with standard church use guidelines.

Meeting was called to order at 7:01PM by President Torkelson. Opening Devotion was shared by Grace Rossman. The July 21, 2025 minutes were approved.

<u>Treasurer's report:</u> Grace Rossman. Volunteers for the audit committee will be acted upon at a future meeting.

<u>Buildings and Grounds:</u> The Council recommends changing the steeple light time to 9:30 PM, leaving the Air Conditioning schedule as is, and adding inspection of the emergency lights and exit signs to the annual fire inspection.

#### Old Business:

1. A motion was made by Mark Beecher and seconded by Julia Keepper to accept the recommendation for using a wireless security camera system vs. a hard-wired system. Carried. A motion was made by Grace Rossman and seconded by Mark Beecher to accept the proposal from Quantum to upgrade the WIFI throughout the building. Carried. A motion was made by Mark Beecher, seconded by President Torkelson, to accept the proposal to upgrade the telephone system. Carried. A motion was made by President Torkelson, seconded by Mark Beecher, to engage Schaut Technologies to do a review and provide additional guidance on the cyber security plan for the church. Carried.

- 2. Pastor Honig reported that an advertisement for hiring a Congregational Care Coordinator will be run in the Pulse newspaper for 1 week.
- 3. President Torkelson asked if any feedback was available about the recent congregational meeting. Grace Rossman indicated that questions were voiced by attendees, indicating that people were paying attention. By consensus, the council believes another meeting should be considered for July 2026.

#### **New Business:**

- 1. A request has been made by AA to use the church bus, driven by Richard Burress, for a trip to Washington Island. The ferry fee to be paid by AA and donations for gas will be accepted. Motion approved.
- 2. A request was made by the Norrland Resort Condo Owners Association to use the building for their fall meeting September 6, 2025 at 9:30 AM for 1.5 hours. Instructions for building use and respect for other simultaneous users will be communicated through Carol in the church office. Motion approved.
- 3. The council discussed updating the congregation's mission statement. Ideas may be guided by the solicitation of values from the congregation, with wording to be considered for an updated mission statement at a later date.
- 4. An improved volunteer sign up sheet system was discussed. Various locations and content were also discussed. Council members were encouraged by President Torkelson to look around for locations to consider.
- 5. The September Sunday Fellowship Potluck is scheduled for Sep 7, 2025.

## **Building and Grounds**

**Wi-Fi and Phone Service** – After having some groups and functions recently that experienced connectivity problems in various parts of the building, B&Gs recommended to the Council that we have Wi-Fi installed throughout the building. Quantum Technologies was here on September 15<sup>th</sup> doing just that. Now we have service evenly throughout the entire building. Quantum Technologies will also be here soon to upgrade our phones that are very old and no longer supported and provide us with new lower-cost phone service.

**Security** – The equipment for the outside video surveillance cameras was ordered and delivered. It will be installed soon. Additional quotes for door security have been received and are now being evaluated.

**Stained Glass Window Inspection** – A second company has been contacted to look at our windows and advise us of their condition. They will be visiting in early October for the inspection.

**Emergency Lighting and Ext Signs** – The quote has been accepted by the Council to include the 28 emergency lights and 23 Exit signs scattered throughout the building and bell tower to our annual inspection of the fire extinguishers.

**Fall Clean-up Day** – Wow, Thank you. We had about 10 volunteers come and help on a beautiful day. Inside the kitchen pantry supply shelves were organized and cleaned, all the Sunday Schools chairs and tables were cleaned, and the floors in the sanctuary storage closets were swept. Outside the weeds behind the bus barn were cut down, flower beds were weeded, brushes trimmed or cut down, hoses picked up and rain gutters cleaned out.

#### October 5: Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost

**Introduction to the readings:** It's a miracle! Multiple miracles! The waters of holy baptism have healed us. The body and blood of Jesus in holy communion have made us clean. We have died with Christ and been raised with him. For all this we have returned to offer thanks. From this place we are sent on our way rejoicing to share the good news.

#### October 19: Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Jeremiah 31:27-34

After uttering many oracles of judgment, Jeremiah announces a day of hope when God will make a new covenant with Israel and Judah, a covenant written upon their hearts and sealed with God's forgiveness.

**Introduction to the readings:** Pray always. Do not lose heart. This is Christ's encouragement in the gospel today. Wrestle with the word. Remember your baptism again and again. Come regularly to Christ's table. Persistence in our every encounter with the divine will be blessed.

First Lesson: Jeremiah 31:31-34 Second Lesson: Romans 3:19-28 Holy Gospel: John 8:31-36


The WELCA Prayer Chain continues to serve all the members and friends of SOTB for prayer requests.
