Sunday Morning Worship

The staff and Congregation Council have had extensive conversations since November about whether we will hold in person Lenten services and meals this year. The consensus is that we would like to be able to do both. Tentatively, we are moving forward with that assumption. However, the current situation with Covid still leaves many questions unanswered and how best to provide for these important gatherings in our life together. We will need to finalize those plans before the March newsletter is published, so watch the weekly email or call the church office for updated plans about Lenten services and meals.

One thing, thankfully, that most of us don't become experts at is knowing what should happen or how things should get done when someone dies and we prepare for the funeral. Often, people are confronted with those tasks suddenly; in other situations, those plans come after a long time of caring for someone who dies slowly.

As a pastor, I often hear words from a grieving family, "We just want to have a celebration of life." And I say, "Of course!" Celebrating is, in fact, what a funeral is all about. As Christians, we have much to celebrate in the context of death. We celebrate all at once the love we have for the one who has died and the love of God in Christ who holds our departed love one and also holds us in mercy, especially when we are grieving and lost.

Centuries ago, Martin Luther, who was a pastor as well as a theologian and reformer, reminded is parishioners that the funeral has two chief goals: to comfort those who mourn and to commend our beloved into God's care. Comfort and commendation are not solely about mourning. Comfort offers not just recognition of pain; it offers joy as well. In a funeral commendation, we are saying, "We want You, Holy One, to embrace this beloved one throughout eternity.

The funeral, in the Christian tradition is an important ritual event that has the capacity to carry our emotions and give us the peace that arises when we have marked a serious and important occasion. Someone who has been a part of our lives will be missed, and we need to name the words and deeds that live on in those who are mourning. Emotions never come one at a time. We are complicated. And when we are faced with a monumental change in our lives because someone we have relied on for decades or welcomed into our lives for only a short time has died, we want to express our love. We cry and laugh at the same time when we remember our loved one.

We learn from experts in sociology and psychology that grief is not something we shut out of our lives; grief is an essential response to love. Grief is love. A funeral is the occasion for giving over to God all the feelings that arise.

A critical aspect of ritual (and a funeral, like all worship, is a ritual event) is the fact that it has an ending. The funeral begins and, at the end, the moment comes when we leave the gravesite. Or maybe we don't go to the gravesite and we go into the fellowship hall for a meal. A curtain has been lifted and then lowered. Life goes on. We do not forget the one we yearn for and will continue to miss in the future, but we have given that relationship a ritual ending. Our grief is not over. It will come and go over the year or maybe forever, but holding a funeral puts a boundary around the conclusion of a life.

In our tradition, the funeral (or memorial service) begins with the promises of baptism: "When we were baptized into Christ Jesus, we were baptized into his death. . ." And then with prayer, song, scripture readings, preaching, holy communion, and commendation, we surround ourselves with God's word that says we are not alone, we are not abandoned. At a time when hearts most need consolation, the funeral offers it.

One of the things that all of us can do that will offer particular help and comfort to our families is to do some thinking and planning about the kind of funeral we'd like to have when our loved ones remember us, celebrate our life, and commend us to God's care. I have put together a worksheet that can help you think about and plan for your own funeral service. Often, I sit with families as they struggle to remember the scripture passages that their loved one would have wanted read, or which hymns they wanted to be sung. Who should read the lessons? Who will give the eulogy, or would my loved one even have wanted a eulogy? The funeral planning guide will give you a chance to think about those things and offer indispensable guidance for your loved ones after your death.

As you complete the worksheet or after you have finished it, I would also encourage you to make an appointment with me so that we can talk through your hopes and address any questions you might have. The worksheet can be downloaded from our website and printed or you can contact the church office and we'd be happy to mail one to you.

In the face of death, we rejoice in the immense healing power of the gospel of Jesus. Remembering and experiencing that gospel is a vivid reminder that God's immeasurable love surrounds us at all times, in life, through death, and forever.

Have you ever noticed the Latin inscription found at the end of important musical compositions by Johann Sebastian Bach and George Friedrich Handel? *Soli Deo Gloria* appears at the end of every sacred work composed by Bach and many of his secular compositions, as well. Handel added this inscription to many of his oratorios, as did a lesser known (to us) composer Christoph Graupner. So what's this all about?

Translated into English, the Latin phrase means *To God Alone Is the Glory* or *Glory to God Alone*. When someone affixes this phrase to a composition or a work of art or to the end (or beginning) of a conversation, the understanding is that whatever has been created or spoken is meant for the glory of God, not for ourselves.

In this age of self-glorification, our society continues the age-old tendency to celebrate the celebrity, whether s/ he is a famous solo musician or talented novelist or a valued musical composer. We tend to applaud the performers and overlook the majesty of the original work of art. Bach and Handel shined a different light on their life's works, however, pointing to God in all things, giving glory and attribution to One who is beyond all human endeavors. God, the source of all creation, was the focal point of every effort, the inspiration for everything that had beauty, meaning and purpose.

This concept of attributing all good and creative things to God was perhaps the inspiration for Fanny Jane Crosby's words, set to music by William Howard Doane in 1875. The marriage of music and text remains familiar to our ears a century and a half later. *Soli Deo Gloria!*

To God be the glory, great things He hath done! So loved He the world that He gave us His Son, Who yielded His life an atonement for sin, And opened the life-gate that all may go in.

Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, Let the earth hear His voice! Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, Let the people rejoice! O come to the Father through Jesus the Son, And give Him the glory: great things He hath done!

> Great things He hath taught us, great things He hath done, And great our rejoicing through Jesus the Son; But purer, and higher, and greater will be Our wonder, our transport, when Jesus we see.

Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, Let the earth hear His voice! Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, Let the people rejoice! O come to the Father through Jesus the Son, And give Him the glory: great things He hath done!

I hope to see you in church, where we can gather together to glorify God in our singing, in our praying and in our fellowship. What a family of believers we have become! May we continue to find God in every corner of our lives and give God the glory!

Praise God, from whom all blessings flow; Praise God, all creatures here below; Praise God above, ye heavenly host; Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Amen.

Soli Deo Gloria!

Building and Grounds Committee

The Building and Grounds Committee is looking for a new member, ladies you are welcome. New perspectives are always welcome. Contact Tom Tuttle if you are interested.

Church Cleaning – No responses from personal contacts or the high school job posting have been received to date. Two cleaning companies have been contacted with only one returning quote. A help wanted advertisement has also been placed in the Pulse. In the meantime, a small group of volunteers have been cleaning the building since the end of November. Thank you to Ruth Ann Hjelle and Erik Olson, Grace and Glen Rossman, Scott Thies, Jane and Dick Burress.

Building Maintenance

Rear Entrance Ladies Restroom – The fan in the space heater started making a lot of noise recently. The problem was a worn bearing on the fan motor which was allowing the fan blade to hit the grill on the front of the heater. The motor bearing was not serviceable, so the heater was replaced with an energy efficient electric radiator. The new unit has been working for just over 1 week now and seems to be doing a good job keeping the room warm during our recent cold spell.



Holding Tank Filling – In the December newsletter, I reported an issue with the holding tank

filling prematurely. As it turns out, we were filling the 5000gal tank every 2 weeks. The tank was emptied 3 times from early December to January 2nd and each time 5000 gallons was removed. Two problems were found. The first, was that one of the steamers used to humidify the air inside the building was using more water than necessary, so excess water was running down the drain. Eagle Mechanical came in early January to repair the unit and it is now working properly. The toilets were checked to make sure they were not leaking, and all the flapper valves were replaced as a precaution. One toilet in the Men's Room also had a bad fill valve and was replaced. The holding tank was pumped again on January 19th and only 2000 gallons were removed.

Nativity – The nativity will be taken down sometime in the next week or so when the weather gets warmer.

AV Desk – There have been a couple technical issues recently that have caused us to miss live streaming Sunday morning. Unfortunately, when it happens there is no way for us to communicate that problem to those of you who may already be online waiting for the service to begin. We do apologize. Carol has researched it, and we have fixed the problem. If it happens again, we should be prepared. No guarantees though as there always seems to be another curve ball waiting to be thrown. Drop us a line every now and then to let us know how we are doing and if there is something that we could do to help improve your online experience.

Lessons for February

February 6 : Fifth Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Isaiah 6:1-8 Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11 Holy Gospel: Luke 5:1-11

Introduction to the readings: The fifth Sunday after Epiphany continues to highlight unlikely instruments and circumstances appointed to reveal God's glory. "Who will go for us?" God asks. A person of unclean lips, a former persecutor of the church of God, and three fishermen who couldn't catch a thing. More surprising still, perhaps, is that we are also called.

February 13 : Sixth Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Jeremiah 17:5-10 Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:12-20 Holy Gospel : Luke 6:17-26

Introduction to the readings: Blessings and curses abound on the sixth Sunday after Epiphany. We would do well to listen closely to whom the "blessed ares" and the "woe tos" are directed and to find our place in the crowd among those who desire to touch Jesus. The risen Christ stands among us in the mystery of the holy supper with an invitation to live in him, and offers power to heal us all.

February 20 : Seventh Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Genesis 45:3-11, 15 Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50 Holy Gospel: Luke 6:27-38

Introduction to the readings: Mercy. Mercy. Mercy. Joseph lives it in Egypt. Jesus preaches it in the gospel. The Spirit guides us into merciful lives with the power of forgiveness to reconcile what is fractured and divided. Such merciful living is the baptismal blessing of having put on Christ. It is the gift of the life-giving Spirit. It is a reflection of God's glory revealed in Christ.

February 27 : Transfiguration of Our Lord

First Lesson: Exodus 34:29-35 Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 3:12 - 4:2 Holy Gospel: Luke 9:28-36

Introduction to the readings: Witnesses to the glory of God in the face of Jesus reflect that glory in the world. It was true for Moses. It was doubtless true for Peter, James, and John. We pray that it will be true of all of us who see God's glory in the word and in the supper and who are being "transformed into the same image" by God's Spirit.
