CONFIDENTIAL!

Stephen Ministry is confidential! Why?

Because trust is vital for a caring relationship. We all experience situations that may leave us feeling vulnerable. When we discuss our feelings and open up to others, we must trust the other person. This trust is based on feeling confident that the information is not going to be shared.

Stephen Ministers take a vow of confidentiality! They do not share vital information about the relationship. They walk with the care receiver, not talk about the care receiver. The identity of care receivers is not shared.

Confidentiality is a cornerstone of Stephen Ministry!

Building and Grounds Committee

Garden Club – Still looking for volunteers to adopt a flower bed. If you could spend some time weeding a flower bed your help would be greatly appreciated. You do not have to commit to every week. Come when you can or when your flower bed needs attention. Talk to Scott Theis or Tom Tuttle. We can set you up to do what you like, whenever it is convenient for you.

Solar Power for the Church – The Committee has asked the Council to consider at their July 17th meeting, what parameters (% reduction in electricity usage or monthly cost, what total cost, what return on investment, etc) should be used by the Committee while they are investigating. The Committee has received responses from all 4 suppliers that were initially contacted. One supplier declined to quote due to the size of the system needed. A second supplier has provided a budgetary quote for a 48kW system (sized based on our past 24 months usage). After incentives and rebates the approximate cost of this system would be \$90,000 with a return on investment calculated at 16-17 years. The system would produce approximately 58% of our annual electricity usage. It would be a ground based fixed array of 120 panels located NE of the Bus Barn. A meeting with the 3rd supplier is scheduled for July 17th. Several phone conversations have been had with the 4th supplier with his quote due by July 21st.

The Council requested B&G to investigate the potential for a solar electric installation at the church. B&Gs investigated this 5 years ago and the investment payback was not very attractive at that time. Since then a number of things have changed and it is worth revisiting it again. The electric usage has been reduced over the last several years which has helped us stay ahead of inflation, however our electric utility bill is still a significant amount. The annual usage has been complied for the last 24 months and provided to several companies. They are in the process of putting their proposals together with their quotes.

Thriving Congregations



July was a busy month for the Thriving Congregation team. Our instructors, Tim Conder and Dan Rhodes, from the Black Mountain School of Theology and Community visited the for their site visit. They visit each church that participates in the Thriving Congregation program. They were here on July 23 for our Debt Retirement, also known as Mortgage Burning, Celebration and Picnic. After the picnic the team met with them to review our progress, then Pastor Jim drove us on the church bus to Northport, through The Clearing, to Baileys Harbor, over to Egg Harbor, then back to our church to show them the most of our communities. Tim, Dan and his wife were graciously hosted by Les and Julia Keepper during their visit.

Our next big activity for Thriving Congregation will be the house meetings. In July we finalized who the house leaders will be. Tara developed a training program for the leaders and that training was conducted on July 24 and 25. We will also conduct training in for a couple of youth so that they will lead some youth sessions. We are excited to get their input.

In early August we will announce the dates and times and sign up procedures for the house meetings. Some of them will be in people's homes and some will be at church. We will have day and evening sessions to accommodate people's schedules and preferences. They will be 60-90 minutes long and will provide an opportunity for 8-12 people to get to know each other better and to share some hopes and dreams with each other. The information for all of the meetings will be reviewed to help determine next steps in this program. We hope that many of you will attend.

As always we thank you for your interest and participation, and especially your prayers, as we continue our efforts to thicken the relationships within our church and thin the walls between our church and the communities we serve. With our major debt behind us we are positioned to reimagine the future and how we will use our time and resources to address our internal needs and the needs of our communities.
