The meeting was called to order by Les Keepper, standing in for Scott Eckdahl who joined the meeting remotely. The Council met in person at SOTB. Pastor Jim opened with a devotional on Acts 1 regarding the choosing of Mathias over Justice and a reading from the book of Isaiah. Also led in opening prayer.

APPROVAL OF LAST MONTHS MINUTES

There was an approval of last months minutes by Dick Burress and seconded by George Cobb

ADDITIONAL ITEMS/APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Scott Eckdahl added a move to add the permission to the Arbor Condo Association to hold their owners meeting at SOTB. This is the same weekend that Linda P. And the youth group will be participating in the 30 Hour Famine held at SOTB on that date, but she will meet in the sanctuary.

Les Keepper brought up the subject of Missions. Pastor Jim acknowledged the creation of a Strategic Planning Team.

Sue Daubner moved to accept the Agenda as given and Cheryl Becht seconded. Passed.

TREASURERS REPORT

Ron Hupe gave out the treasurers report. We are down as of last month. Currently we are trending the same as last April. Motion to approve the Treasurers Report by Dick Burress, seconded by George Cobb Passed

COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. <u>PASTORS REPORT</u> - In accordance with CDC revision of the guidelines, we will be continuing to observe social distancing but will be relaxing mask and Pre-registration. Because of the continuing attendance, we will continue the Parking Lot Church where parking will be at the parkers discretion.

Confirmation will be held on June 6 with 5 confirmands from 2020 and 1 from this year.

We will be cancelling the Sunday AM Zoom conversations. In person Tuesday Bible class will resume June Also, Theology on Tap will start again in June and continue once a month.

We do not know at this point, when indoor Fellowship Hour will resume.

Cheryl Becht and Pastor Jim attended the East Central Synod of Wisconsin Assembly. Four resolutions were passed "Opening the Way for Women, People of Color and LGBTQIA," "Support for ELCA World Hunger Efforts", "Participation in WELCA" and "On Becoming Anti-Racist". The four resolutions passed with a 97% majority vote.

AA has been notified that they will need to meet in the choir room May 29 because of the Northland Condo Owners meeting.

The suggestion, which he has noted in the past, is that these monies be handed over to a Community Association that would have the mechanics in place to advertise and distribute. Scott and Pastor Jim will verbally discuss this again with Werner. This account has different rules than the remainder of the Endowment Fund.



Synod Assembly

The Synod Assembly of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin was held virtually on May 14-15. Pr. Jim and Cheryl Becht were the delegates from Shepherd of the Bay. This was the annual business meeting of the synod. The budget was passed as proposed. Dr. Ann Madsen was the plenary speaker and bible study leader. Elections were held for synod council and other committees, as well as delegates to the Churchwide Assembly. The following resolutions were passed, all with more than 97% assent.

Resolution #1

Opening the Way for Women, People of Color, and LGBTQIA+ Candidates For Rostered Ministry

WHEREAS, the body of Christ is made of a collection of diverse images of God; and WHEREAS, God calls us to work for peace for all people through justice; and

WHEREAS, women, people of color, and LGBTQIA+ candidates wait longer for calls than their white, straight, male, cis gendered colleagues; and

WHEREAS, the ELCA is one of the least racially diverse denomination in the US (see below); and WHEREAS, representation in leadership matters; and





Opening the Way

This resolution aims to have rostered leaders in call facilitate discussion with their congregations regarding future openness to diverse candidates. A discussion guide for these conversations is in the works.

RESOLVED, that congregations will utilize an *Opening the Way* discussion guide that is in process of being developed and will be made available to all congregations.

Resolution #4 ON BECOMING ANTI-RACIST

WHEREAS, we acknowledge that racism exists in our country, our state, our communities, our churches and within each of us, and

WHEREAS, the East Central Synod of Wisconsin (ECSW) has actively promoted anti-racism by providing opportunities for clergy and lay persons to receive anti-racism education, and

WHEREAS, by our baptismal promise, we are to "care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace", and

WHEREAS, we know that any change requires action, and

WHEREAS, anti-racism best occurs in relationship, and

WHEREAS, the churches of ECSW have few Black/Brown/Asian members,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

THEREFORE, that the ECSW churches:

- provide opportunities for conversation with indigenous groups in our synod, such as the Church of the Wilderness, the sole indigenous church in our synod,
- search out ways to forge relationships with people of Black, Brown, and Asian descent, bridging new understandings,
- provide opportunities for discussion and learning about anti-racism with their members,
- take action to reach out in their communities, engaging in conversation to consider the steps needed to bring justice and equity for all, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

THEREFORE, that as the East Central Synod of Wisconsin, we elevate our efforts to work collectively toward becoming anti-racist, striving to grow in relationship as peoples created in the image of God and sharing the love of God with all the people of our global family.

Initial Actions for Consideration:

- Access the Diversity Coordinator available in larger communities, i.e. Appleton & Green Bay.
- Community Facebook pages will announce events where you are likely to meet members of minority communities.
- Attend local meetings often held in community centers or local libraries listen, learn and make connections.
- Through United Way or local school district data, become aware of ethnic populations, and where they live in your city or county .
- Research which indigenous people once lived on the land where your church is built.

Lessons for June

June 6: Second Sunday After Pentecost

First Lesson: Genesis 3:8-15

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 4:13--5:1

Holy Gospel: Mark 3:20-35

Introduction to the readings: A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus makes this observation in light of charges that he is possessed. He is possessed, not by a demon, but by the Holy Spirit. We who have received the Holy Spirit through baptism have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection and knit together in the body of Christ. Those with whom we sing and pray this day are Jesus' family. With them we go forth in peace to do the will of God.

June 13: Third Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Ezekiel 17:22-24

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 5:6-10, [11-13]14-17

Holy Gospel: Mark 4:26-34

Introduction to the readings: The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

June 20: Fourth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Job 38:1-11

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 6:1-13

Holy Gospel: Mark 4:35-41

Introduction to the readings: Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation! Now we are in the storm, the boat almost swamped; but Jesus is here now, and when we call him, he will calm the storm. Even the wind and waves listen to him as they would to their creator. We also listen to him and are called to believe in the power of God's word in him, a power greater than all that we fear.

June 27: Fifth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Lamentations 3:22-33 Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

Holy Gospel: Mark5:21-43

Introduction to the readings: A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.


