The leaves have gone through their bright, vibrant colors and, while still colorful in many cases, they are moving towards their winter dormancy — either brown or gone. The temperatures fall and give us a foretaste of the cold that is to come. Perhaps we even see a few sprinkle of sno



foretaste of the cold that is to come. Perhaps we even see a few sprinkle of snow here and there. The month ends with one of the favorite American holidays, A Day of National Thanksgiving.

November is also a rich time for worship. The month begins with All Saints Sunday and ends with Christ the King and Thanksgiving. November gives us space to pull out our church's family album, to remember where we came from and where we're going. Isaac Newton said, "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants." The church's giants – the saints, our church family – are uplifted in November with a force unlike any other part of the church year. Saints comes from the Latin sanctus, which means holy. In the Lutheran tradition, we think of saints as God's holy people, living or dead, who have been baptized into Christ, not so much the martyrs or famous Christians who have died.

Those saints we remember, from the past and present, are the ones who have passed on the faith to us, who have given us words to describe our faith, whose examples help us live out the faith. Here at Shepherd of the Bay, we stand on the shoulders of generous and faithful people who have handed off to us this vibrant ministry that we now enjoy and which we now build on. The saints have shown us how to express our faith, how to stand up for what we believe, and how to care for others.

It is awe-inspiring to think of how this picture of the saints is so large, so old, so methodical, and that we are part of a long journey and an ongoing story. Looking at the saints and where we sit in the picture both inspires us to live out our lives in holiness and to get outside of ourselves for a moment to catch a glimpse of God's plan for the world. On November 4, we will remember the saints who have meant so much to us, those of our Faith family who have died in the past year, but also our own family members and friends.

Christ the King Sunday, on November 23 is the final Sunday in the church year. The gospel texts for that day take us back to Good Friday and to the picture of the crucified Jesus talking to two criminals, one on either side of him. This strange image of a crucified king brings to mind the central good news of our faith, that we have been invited into relationship by a God who does not sit high on a throne separated in time and space from the people of the kingdom, but one who desires to be with us, the saints of the kingdom, in all moments of our lives.

November is also the month of our National Day of Thanksgiving. While we don't have a Thanksgiving service at Shepherd of the Bay, every Sunday service is a thanksgiving for all God has done and continues to do in our lives in our church, in our community and in the world. As you gather with family and friends in whatever way you celebrate Thanksgiving, I know your table will be filled with prayers of gratitude for so many blessings.

Also, starting in November, we're going to launch an initiative for growth and enrichment. On the 2nd and 4th Sunday of each month, we'll gather after our coffee and fellowship time — 11:00-ish — in the choir loft for an Adult Forum that will take a look at our ELCA social statements. We'll take one statement each month and look at what our church believes, teaches, and confesses about a broad spectrum of social issues. In November, we'll study one of the earliest social statements, "The Church in Society."

Finally, thanks to all who participated in our Fall Giving Campaign, "A Chorus of Generosity. On Sunday, October 19, we received approximately 65 intention cards, over halfway to our goal of 120 intentions. Thanks for your generosity and faithfulness in supporting the ongoing vitality and growth of our ministry in 2026. And if you haven't yet returned your intention card, please do so today and add your voice to our "Chorus of Generosity."

September 15, 2025

Meeting was called to order at 7:00PM by President Torkelson

Opening Devotion

Minutes of the August 18, 2025 meeting approved.

2 Items added to the agenda by Tara Torkelson AED Awareness and Red Cross Shelter.

Treasurers Report was presented by Grace Rossman

The Committee reports were reviewed.

Discussion about opportunities for social interaction in the upcoming months included afternoon gatherings for games. Pr. Honig offered to be among the volunteers to help organize. Dates were discussed for the upcoming year.

Old Business.

- 1. Security cameras have arrived, testing is upcoming with the updated connectivity.
- 2. Motion approved to hire Amy Hennings as Congregational Care Coordinator as recommended by the interview
- 3. "Leading with love, serving with heart, spreading hope through God's grace. Everybody, everybody, everybody is welcome here." as offered by Julia Keepper was discussed as an updated Mission Statement for the congregation. Motion approved

New Business.

- A. Motion approved for the Peninsula Music Festival request for facility use August 21, 2026.
- B. Motion to approve \$500.00 dues to our Synod regional sub-group, The Green Bay Conference, for mission projects, was carried. The area ranges from Washington Island to Manitowoc.
- C. Potluck is scheduled for Oct 5, 2025.
- Bus use request Oct 10, 2025. Scott Henry to drive anyone interested to the Dudley Birder Chorale concert in Green Bay. No conflict in the bus schedule was identified.
- E. An AED and Blood Pressure Cuff are available in church, AED and CPR training is available from the Red Cross. The council will discuss further at the next meeting.
- F. The Red Cross has inquired about use of the church as an emergency disaster shelter. To be discussed further at the next meeting.

From the Treasurer:

A budget is a best guess prediction of what the next year holds, and it's a great science to get it 'right'. Actual results will always vary.

As I do during every monthly council meeting, I reported our financial condition as of the last of September during our last council meeting. We are currently running a deficit, meaning our expenses have exceeded the income. Expenses are very close to what we budgeted, but our income has not kept pace with our budget. We are currently seeing a deficit of about \$60,000, roughly 8% of the annual budgeted income.

As I told the council, this is the hardest past of the year for a treasurer, as results become very real and sometimes painful. Typically, the last three months of the year are very strong for Shepherd of the Bay, and we see deficits melt. I'm not in a panic yet, since there are three months of the year still remaining.

Building and Grounds

Quantum Technologies – Extending the WIFI network throughout the entire building is complete. The new Phone service has been installed.

Security – Door Locks and Cameras - The security camera equipment was delivered on Saturday, September 13th and is in the church office. Installation is pending. The B&Gs Committee agreed at their last meeting to reopen the discussion with Premier Lock and Door to have them update their quote to include the 2nd floor after the discussions with the Fire Department. Their initial quote for the 1st floor was the least expensive. Waiting for their updated quote.

Exit and Emergency Lighting – Vans/Marimic Fire and Safety has been hired to do the routine inspection of all the Emergency backup lights and Exit signs. They had previously only inspected the fire extinguishers. The lights and signs were inspected October 14th. Two emergency lights were replaced (expected), and 2 Exit signs were replaced. New batteries for the backup lights have been ordered. Twelve old style Exit lights that do not have battery backup and no longer meet code will need to be replaced next year at an estimated cost of \$2500.

Stained Glass Windows – Conrad Schmitt Studios is expected to inspect the windows the 1st week of November. An exact date has not yet been established.

Outside Maintenance – Karl Omernick has agreed to trim all the trees immediately around the building this Fall or Winter. A couple Tree Service companies have been contacted (waiting for responses) to grind out the stump on the west side of the steeple. Scott Theis and Dick Burress cleaned the siding on the north side of the building outside the Choir Room to remove the green mold. They also cleaned the outside of the sanctuary windows. Les Keepper has agreed to shovel the sidewalks again this winter. Steve Neuy has been hired again to do the snow plowing this winter.

Sanctuary Ceiling Insulation – The Council was asked last month to approve adding a second layer of insulation above the sanctuary last month. This would increase the R-value from 38 to 50 and in conjuncture with the spray foaming of the recessed lights done last Fall would significantly reduce the heating and cooling costs. I am waiting to hear whether it will be done this year or next.

AC for 2nd Floor – The smoke and humidity this summer made the youth summer program a little uncomfortable. Some of the participants have asthma which was aggravated by the smoke. Next year's budget should include \$9000 for a new AC unit. I have not heard of the Council's decision.

Furnace Maintenance – Eagle Mechanical has been under a "gentleman's agreement" to service the HVAC systems in the Spring and Fall. I have confirmed that they will continue doing so until informed otherwise. They will be doing their Fall maintenance on all 8 furnaces this year.

Lessons for November

November 2 : All Saints Sunday

Lesson: Ephesians 1:11-2	<u>23</u>
Holy Gospel: Luke 6:20-2	

Introduction to the readings: In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In holy communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. In worship today we give thanks for all the saints "who from their labors rest." In the same breath we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of Jesus in today's gospel. Sealed by the Spirit and sustained by the Savior's body and blood, we live with joy as God gives us breath, to the praise of God's glory.

November 9: Twenty Second Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: <u>Haggai 1:15b - - 2:9</u>

Haggai called on the exiles who had returned from Babylon to rebuild the temple. The rebuilt temple, however, pales in comparison with the first temple, built by Solomon. Haggai's message of encouragement and promise of future splendor gives hope to the people and to their leaders.

Second Lesson: 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Holy Gospel: Luke 20:27-38

Introduction to the readings: We worship on the first day of the week because Jesus was raised on that day. Every Sunday is a little Easter. This Sunday feels more like Easter than many as the appointed texts celebrate the reality of the resurrection. Live it up this Lord's day. Our God is the God of the living.

November 16: Twenty Third Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Isaiah 65:17-25

Addressing the exiles who had returned to Jerusalem from Babylon, the prophet proclaims a vision of a future time of peace and prosperity. Though the returned exiles are experiencing hard times, God is about to do a new thing.

Second Lesson: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Holy Gospel: Luke 21:5-19

Introduction to the readings: The end is near. There is no doubt about it. The warnings are dire. The tone of today's texts is ominous. But the baptized know how to live in the meantime. The baptized are strengthened for the living of these days in word and sacrament. The baptized rally around the invitation of the apostle: "Do not be weary in doing what is right."

November 23: Christ the King Sunday

First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Today's reading builds on the common, ancient Near Eastern metaphor of the king as shepherd. Judah's unjust rulers have caused their people, their "flock," to be scattered. Nevertheless, God will raise up a new and righteous shepherd who will rule a restored Judah.

Second Lesson: Colossians 1:11-20

Holy Gospel: Luke 23:33-43

Introduction to the readings: Jeremiah's promise of the execution of "justice and righteousness in the land" finds ironic fulfillment in the execution of Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. It appears utterly contradictory that a king should be crucified with a criminal. This victory appears for all the world as humiliating defeat. Yet through the gate of death Jesus opens the door to paradise.

November 30: First Sunday of Advent

First Lesson: Lamentations 3:55-57

Holy Gospel: Luke 1:5-13

Prayer of Confession: Ever-present God, we long to feel you close. We long to feel your presence in our lives. We long for you to break through the chaos and suffering of this world. However, if we're honest, we rarely stand still long enough to feel you in our midst. Forgive our rushing and distractions. Forgive our wandering hearts, and center us in this space. Remind us that even in the time of Herod, even on the longest nights, you are always there. Amen.
