FROM THE MUSIC

When there are no words, music speaks an inner language of truth and beauty.

CORNEF The beauty of a musical phrase, the colorful sound of an orchestra, the purity of the human voice ... all of these elements are able to tell extraordinary stories without uttering a single word. Expression is carried by "Songs without Words" according to Felix Mendelssohn, who wrote two volumes of piano music under this interesting title. Individual pieces were given suggestive titles, leading the listener to imagine a picture of Consolation or a Venetian Boat Song, Reverie, Spinning Song or The Brook, each vignette painted with the colors of sounds, a story being told through images created by pitch and timbre.

Sometimes a musical piece has no specific title connected to it. A story or emotion evolves in the listener's imagination as the music reveals itself. We think of being "taken away" by a beautiful sound or compelling melody. The emotional images are personal, not universally shared by a multitude of people. We are sometimes transported from the busyness of our lives to a more tranquil, introspective moment of imagery and peace by the vehicle of a simple song without words.

Prayer offers a similar experience. Sometimes there are no words to convey our wishes or yearnings to God. We don't have the ability to form our thoughts into cohesive phrases and paragraphs. The petitions that we might offer are without form and verbal organization. It is at these times that a **"Prayer without**" Words" might serve to open the connection between us and God. To quiet ourselves and allow God to speak to us through nature, through a bird song, through the breeze gently whispering in the leaves of trees.

"Be still, and know that I am God."

How often we miss these opportunities to hear the voice of God in our daily lives, giving signs of love and comfort and direction to our wearv souls.

"Be still, and know that I am God."

Perhaps it might be a good time to take a solitary walk in the woods and listen, simply listen for that still, small voice of comfort, assurance, companionship, clarity. When we have no answers and only questions, this might be a time to simplify our process and "pray without words" and find all that we need in the stillness of such a prayer.

"Be still, and know that I am God."

 Psalm 46 GOD is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult.

> There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High. God is in the midst of the city; it shall not be moved; God will help it when the morning dawns. The nations are in an uproar, the kingdoms totter; he utters his voice, the earth melts. The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

> Come, behold the works of the LORD; see what desolations he has brought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; he breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. **"Be still, and know that I am God!** I am exalted among the nations, I am exalted in the earth." The LORD of hosts is with us; The God of Jacob is our refuge.

May our prayers resonate with the voice of God, as we learn to pray without words.




Advent - A time of Waiting

Building and Grounds Committee

The Building and Grounds Committee is looking for a new member, ladies you are welcome. New perspectives are always welcome. Contact Tom Tuttle if you are interested.

Flood Lights – All the new lights and outlets have been installed. The road sign lights have outlets included to make the



run for the extension cord shorter for Christmas nativity. The building lights are installed with the addition of a light near the back entrance to Klaud's pantry. That was possible because we found an old light base buried under the mulch when we tore out the old long needled pine bushes. The steeple lights have been changed so that they now concentrate the light on the steeple and not cast it out to either side. Now that the lights are working, we discovered 2 issues; 1) the timer for the steeple lights is not working, and 2) the light on the north side of the building behind the chancel is not working. Both issues should be resolved soon.

2nd Floor AC – Council approved replacing the AC for the 2nd Floor in next year's budget. We have one verbal quote for just under \$8000 but have yet to get it a written confirmation. Calls have been made to 2 additional contractors without a response to date. Will keep trying.

Narthex Water Fountain – After the leak from the water fountain was fixed, for about 1 week, it has started leaking again. The plumber has been notified.

Building Exterior – The white aluminum trim piece on the big west window behind the organ that blew off earlier in the year has been reinstalled. The rain gutter over the rear entrance to Klaud's pantry has also been reinstalled. It had been taken down for the siding and roof and hadn't gotten replaced.

AV Desk – Our processor which had been out for repair since June has now been returned. We had been using a couple of "loaners" to keep us operational. The repaired processor was installed a couple of weeks ago and the firmware was updated to the latest version. I had hoped that the firmware update would resolve an annoying problem we where we lose the video input to our livestream. Unfortunately, that did not seem to resolve it, because we lost the video to the livestream again on Sunday, October 23rd. I think I discovered a fix that will allow us to regain the signal with minimal interruption to the service. Time will tell.

Lessons for November

Nov. 6 : All Saints Sunday

First Lesson: Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18 Second Lesson: Ephesians 1:11-23 Holy Gospel: Luke 5:20-31

Introduction to the readings: In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In holy communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. In worship today we give thanks for all the saints "who from their labors rest." In the same breath we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of Jesus in today's gospel. Sealed by the Spirit and sustained by the Savior's body and blood, we live with joy as God gives us breath, to the praise of God's glory.

Nov. 13 : Twenty Third Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Malachi 4:1-2a Second Lesson: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13 Holy Gospel : Luke 21:5-19

Introduction to the readings: The end is near. There is no doubt about it. The warnings are dire. The tone of today's texts is ominous. But the baptized know how to live in the meantime. The baptized are strengthened for the living of these days in word and sacrament. The baptized rally around the invitation of the apostle: "Do not be weary in doing what is right."

Nov. 20 : Christ the King Sunday

First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6 Second Lesson: Colossians 1:11-20 Holy Gospel: Luke 23:33-43

Introduction to the readings: Jeremiah's promise of the execution of "justice and righteousness in the land" finds ironic fulfillment in the execution of Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. It appears utterly contradictory that a king should be crucified with a criminal. This victory appears for all the world as humiliating defeat. Yet through the gate of death Jesus opens the door to paradise.

Nov. 27: First Sunday of Advent

First Lesson: Isaiah 2:1-5 Second Lesson: Romans 13:11-14 Holy Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44

Introduction to the readings: The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.




