ANNUAL MEETING SHEPHERD OF THE BAY LUTHERAN CHURCH January 25, 2015

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2013 Shepherd of the Bay Annual Meeting January 26, 2014

Present: Members of the congregation and council members

Meeting called to order by President, Lawrie Kull at 10:00 a.m.

Pastor Foster opened the meeting in prayer.

The minutes from the January 2012 meeting were approved by Dick Burress, second by George Cobb. Motion carried. These minutes were inadvertently not approved at the 2012 annual meeting. The minutes from the January 2013 meeting were approved by Greg Casperson, second by Tom MacDonald. Motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was given by Ron Hupe. He reviewed with the congregation the refinancing of the mortgage with Thrivent Financial from 5 ½% down to 4 ½%. This reduced the monthy payment by \$2,000 a month. Giving was up for December and was overall a good financial year with expenses under control. Motion made by Werner Krause to accept the minutes, second by Jim Nelson. Motion carried.

Werner Krause reported on the Endowment fund. He explained how this is a great way to make a long term pledge to the mission of Shepherd of the Bay. The return on investment was over 14% in 11 months. Wally Brand accepted the minutes, second by Sue Daubner. Motion carried.

President Lawrie Kull thanked Ken Bergner & Bill Henning for fulfilling their two 2 year terms on the Church Council. He thanked them for their efforts and time spent serving the church.

Marilyn Peterson, chair of the Nominating committee, presented the nominations for the church council, Audit committee, scholarship committee and endowment committee.

Church Council nominations: Lars Larsen & Grace Rossman elected to their first two year term. Greg Casperson elected to a one year term to fill a resignation spot. Dick Luther made a motion to accept, second by Diane Overby. Motion carried. Judi Nelson & Barb MacDonald elected to their second two year term. Motion made by Dick Burress, second by Werner Krause. Motion carried.

Scholarship committee: Jan Mielke; Audit committee: Scott Schultz & John Skogsbakken; Endowment committee: John Zilavy. Motion was made by Greg Casperson, second by Diane Overby. Motion carried to accept all nominations.

Budget for 2014 was presented by Ron Hupe, treasurer. The \$484,722 budgeted income for 2014 does not include pay raises for staff. Surplus from 2013 was used to give bonuses to staff except Pastor Foster who declined. Proposed expenses are in line from last year with money being saved on the refinance of the mortgage. Motion to accept the 2014 budget made by Scott Schultz, second by Jim Nelson. Motion carried.

The council recommended Mission profit & Beart bequest to be disbursed to Bridges, Crossway camping ministries, Laotian Ministry, Mission trip to Guatemala, Help of Door County, Habitat for Humanity, Katie's Fund, Koinonia Cupboard, Northern Door Child Care & Nor Door Adult Day Care. Motion made by Bill Johnson, second by Barb MacDonald. Motion carried.

Pastor Foster addressed the congregation and expressed his appreciation to his congregation, discussed his upcoming retirement in 2015 and reiterated the importance of giving to the church both monetarily and in volunteering. He also thanked Lawrie Kull for his years of service as President of the Council.

President Lawrie Kull thanked the congregation for closing the 2013 year budget with a positive balance and for the opportunity to serve as President of the Council.

The next council meeting will be February 10th, 2014 where the election of officers will occur. Pastor Foster led the congregation in the Lord's Prayer.

Motion to adjourn the annual meeting made by Tom Hinnenthal, second by Sue Daubner.

Pastor's Letter -

A What Does the Lord Require of You?

I had an interesting conversation recently. I was visiting a couple who is new to the community. They have attended church a number of times and I wanted to get to know them better and, of course, find out if they were interested in joining the congregation. After a good conversation about their life and family and how they ended up in Door County, I made the invitation to consider membership in the congregation. The husband asked, "And what is expected of members of the congregation?" Since we were in a very comfortable situation, I responded with a joke, "Do you mean other than taking up your cross daily and following Jesus?" He wasn't offended at all by my comment. Rather he smiled and said, "Of course I mean beyond that."

That really got me thinking. And I said this;

First, we expect members of the congregation to be faithful in worship attendance and participation in the means of grace particularly the Lord's Supper. Worship renews our relationship to God and as a corporate act connects us up to our fellow believers.

Second, we expect members to look at all the gifts that God has given them as opportunities to contribute to the mission of the church - to share the love of God in Christ with everyone they meet. As person experiences the life of the congregation, we hope that they find those places where they can serve using their talents. That includes their financial commitments, but just as vitally, their time and personal abilities.

Third, we expect our members to grow in their personal faith, by daily prayer, Bible reading, and reflection on how God is working in their lives. This personal aspect recognizes that God touches our individual lives very differently and will respond differently.

Fourth, we expect our members to make a public witness to their faith as they participate in their various secular callings as spouses, parents, children, neighbors and citizens. The primary focus of such witness is not formal evangelism but living lives of personal integrity and love.

Of course, much more could be said, but as you look to the year ahead, please consider these four points and how they might shape the way in which you relate to the church.

Then you could just remember one verse from Micah.

He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC COMMITTEE Annual Report 2014

The Worship and Music Committee (WMC) approaches its work with the recognition that worship forms a highly important, central, unifying component of the life of our parish. The WMC works from a fundamental principle that we gather in a common purpose—to worship to glorify and thank God for God's grace given to all in Word and Sacrament. The WMC serves as the corporate memory for SOTB's worship tradition and considers ways to revitalize or enhance present practice. The committee plans, coordinates, facilitates, assists, recruits volunteers (assisting ministers in the broadest sense), monitors attendance, and is attentive to providing and maintaining a suitably appointed worship space. Through its meetings the WMC maintains an ongoing dialog with the Pastor Foster and Minister of Music Gladys Austgen by reflecting on and evaluating recent services as well as thinking collectively about the future, planning services and special emphases for coming seasons of the church year.

This year Carole Bergner and Barb MacDonald volunteered to carry on the tradition of providing floral arrangements to adorn the sanctuary, established by Jackie Hoekstra, who retired from the WMC, and by Mary Lou St. Henry, whose passing saddened us. After many years of coordinating readers for the first Sunday service, Keith Wickert sought retirement from this duty, and Scott Henry volunteered to transition into this role. We bid farewell to Jim Nelson, who for years was a loyal member of the WMC, and to Judi Nelson for her active participation on the WMC as well as serving as liaison to the Council, a role now held by Cathy Mangan. The dedication, creativity, and loyalty of everyone associated with the WMC are outstanding, and each deserves our appreciation for making our worship what it is. In addition to the typical seasonal emphases that enrich our worship, provided by choir, handbells, and music staff, this year a pattern was established to offer an invitation for healing in the Sunday services at least once each quarter. A cantata by J. S. Bach was the performed during the 1st Sunday service on Memorial Day weekend. Musicians from the Cincinnati Christian Hills Academy enlivened our services on All Saints Sunday. On Passion Sunday 1994, parishioners of Shepherd of the Bay first celebrated worship in their new sanctuary. In 2004 the nave was enlarged and the Dobson pipe organ was delivered and installed. In recognition of these 10-and 20-year milestones the WMC's Performing Artists Subcommittee invited two duos for the summer organ concerts. Ken Kowan, who performed here in 2011, returned with his wife and violinist, Lisa Shihoten, for a spectacular concert in June. Peter Richard Conte of Wanamaker Organ fame, assisted by Andrew Ennis on flügelhorn, presented a delightfully diverse program in July. 2014 WORLD MARKETPLACE

Balance at the end of the year 2014 shows \$4800.26 before distribution to our artisans. Checks will be sent to Word Made Flesh, Mayaworks, Behrhorst Clinic, and SERRV. We have abandoned the idea of a low interest loan to SERRV but will continue to support SERRV artisans year to year.

Our product sales were up almost 20% this year while coffee, tea and chocolate sales were down about 15%. Total deposits of \$7336.79. We maintained a product offering available throughout the summer and autumn at the south end of the fellowship hall.

We continue to support Shepherd of the Bay member Wendy Carpenter in her sewing work with the Mayan women in Guatemala. This year's contribution \$1200.00. In addition we will continue to offer product from SERRV, Mayaworks, and the Equal Exchange coffees, teas, and chocolates. This year we have added product from Word Made Flesh a mission in Freetown, Sierra Leone. Word Made Flesh started in 2002 with the vision to serve Jesus among the most vulnerable of the world's poor. We were introduced to this organization through Elizabeth Foster several years ago. We have dropped the wooden utensils from Los Cuchareros in Guatemala.

Our three sales this year included an evening sale in conjunction with WELCA's Olde Ellison Bay Days Spaghetti Dinner, a Saturday sale during the Ellison Bay Historical Society's annual tractor/art fair weekend, and the WELCA luncheon in October. Since we find our success in product sales is directly proportional to the number of tourists in Door, we seek to schedule our sales in recognition of that factor.

On July 26th, 2014 Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church in Ellison Bay, Wi began its celebration of thirty years of outreach to artisans around the world. The special anniversary celebration featured a summer sale with 30% discounts on select items, including all Nativities. Customers were treated to a complimentary cup of Fair Trade coffee and were offered Pastor Foster's famous croissants. Bea's provided some jams and jellies. With our anniversary celebration we have changed our name to WORLD MARKETPLACE.

The marketplace originally referred to as Self-help Crafts began at Shepherd of the Bay when Linda Williams Pletcher, wife of Trinity Lutheran's pastor, traveled to El Salvador with a group from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America called the National Hunger Task Force. The group's purpose was to educate themselves about the situation in El Salvador at that time and to make themselves available to the Lutheran Church located in the capital city of San Salvador. 1984 marked the height of the civil war in that country. At that time Lutheran World Relief had set up refugee camps for the campesinos not only to provide protection but to help the people find purpose while they were in the camps. The refugees were encouraged to make hammocks and create art work which could be sold in the U.S. The money for the crafts would be returned through LWR to help promote the livelihood of the people.

Inspired by the beauty of the people and troubled by their poverty and the political situation, Pletcher brought back some of the handicrafts from the county and made them available to her friends. She was supported in those original efforts by Lorene Beard and Bernice Cassadonte. With her encouragement, Trinity formed its own hunger task force in 1986. Jean Swanson of Sister Bay served as the first chairperson of that committee which supported Pletcher's initiative as well as other social justice concerns at that time. Jean has continued her interest in the marketplace over the years.

In 1987 summer craft sales became a part not only of Trinity and Zion's history but also of the history of many ELCA churches across the U.S. In 1988, the hunger task force became a part of the Social Ministries committee at Trinity. The last sale was held at Zion in 1991. Shepherd of the Bay has carried on the project since that time. While the names of the women on the committee have changed over the years as well as the name for the event, support for the artisans in underdeveloped countries has remained consistent for thirty years.

We thank the council for its support of World Marketplace. Special thanks to Carol Frakes-Omernick for her help, her support, her enthusiasm, and her new ideas; to Pastor and Elizabeth, to Don Buchholz, Juan Casanas, and to all of the members of the congregation who have supported us and continue to offer support.

Building and Grounds Annual Report

We are all very grateful to Linda and Dwight Davis for their efforts and determination with the SOTB Garden Club. They and a number of volunteers made great progress on the church grounds during their work days this summer and fall. Thanks to Linda, Dwight and all the volunteers for their gifts of labor and materials. Thanks also to spring cleanup crew, Don Provo for our lawn care and to John Fitzgerald for plowing the parking lot and driveway.

We are still looking into the feasibility of switching outdoor lighting to more efficient LED lighting. This could reduce electric usage by 1/6th of what we use now. Quantum LED Solutions is also looking at our interior lighting setup, looking at options there too.

Storm windows have been installed on the south windows in the fellowship hall. They have helped considerably with the condensation on the windows in the fellowship hall.

This year Building and Grounds with Worship Committee will be looking into making our worship area more comfortable climate wise, lessening air drafts, better use of fans and keeping temps constant. We want to make our place of worship a comfortable and pleasant place for everyone.



Guatemala Mission Trip

March 7-15, 2014, a team from Shepherd of the Bay had the privilege of serving the Lord through the organization Pray America, working with Mayan widows and orphans on a short term mission trip to Chichicastenango, Guatemala. The team was led by John & Nora Zacek. It consisted of 8 members of Shepherd of the Bay, 1 from Sister Bay Moravian and 3 others.

Our days were filled with various projects. We built 4 houses for widows and repaired and restored 4 other widow houses. We installed 4 water filter systems for healthier drinking water and 4 more efficient cook stoves in homes. We also helped at 3 separate feeding programs for children ranging from 150 - 250 kids. One afternoon, we helped fit 50 children with new shoes so the children would be able to attend school.

We took many items to give to the families including blankets, sweaters, school supplies, coloring books & crayons, small toys, stuffed animals, candy, frisbees and soccer balls. Most importantly, we interacted with the families to share the love of Christ. Our days were long, yet rewarding. There is still much work to be done.

Endowment Committee Annual Report 2014

The Shepherd of the Bay Endowment and the Endowment Committee are dedicated to providing long term financial support to maintain and further those ministries and outreach efforts which are both important and of interest to the members of this congregation.

The Endowment has an invested corpus as of November 30, 2014 of approximately \$150,000. (The 12/30/14 investment report has not yet been issued by the investment advisors.)

The Fund breaks down as follows:

General Endowment Supporting General Operations	\$47,000
Specific Ministry Support	\$32,000
Acorn Fund (Specific Ministry)	\$ 7,000
Women's Scholarship Program	\$64,000

During 2014 the Endowment Committee has refined the policies and procedures for the following:

- The gift acceptance policy which delineates very broad parameters for the gifts it will accept.
- 2) The timing of the declaration and distribution of Endowment funds to the various ministries.
- 3) The assurance that any gifts to the Endowment will have long term impact by assuring their long term existence.

During 2014 the Women's Scholarship Fund has assisted in financing the education of a single mother so that she can advance her skill levels from an LPN to a full Registered Nurse and better provide for and support her family.

The Committee is planning a major community outreach program on Estate Planning for all generations to be held in the Fall of 2015.
