2015 Shepherd of the Bay Church Annual Meeting

January 31, 2016

Present: Members of the Congregation and Council Members

President Greg Casperson called the meeting to order at 10:17 a.m. and declared a quorum present as necessary. Interim/Visiting Pastor Mike Zolnosky (hereinafter "*Pastor Mike*") opened the meeting in prayer.

Motion/Second to approve the 2015 Shepherd of the Bay Church Annual meeting minutes as reported and presented to the congregation; motion passed.

Treasurer Ron Hupe presented a breakdown of the 2015 year-end balance sheet balance sheet for Shepherd of the Bay Church. Hupe mentioned that December of 2015 was the best month for donations that he could remember in recent years, but that 2015 ended with a loss/deficit which was presented to the congregation for review and consideration. Motion Diane Overby/second Wally Brandt to accept the 2015 Budget Report as presented by the Treasurer.

Nominating Committee Chair Carole Bergner presented the nominations for Church Council, the Scholarship Committee, Nominating Committee and Endowment Committee as follows:

Church Council:

Endowment Committee: Werner Krause

Motion George Cobb/second Tom MacDonald to accept the slate of nominations for Church Council, Scholarship Committee, Nominating Committee and Endowment Committee. Motion passed.

Werner Krause presented the annual report for the Endowment Committee and explained the composition of the committee, including term limits. Funders were first distributed from the Endowment in 2015; other distributions will be managed annually by the committee. He also explained the "Mustard Seed" Fund, which can be started by any member or party with only a \$2,000.00 contribution and a pledge that such fund shall be contributed to annually for up to ten years until it has grown to \$10,000.00 within ten years, and thus may then be distributed like the other funds. Dick Burress asked for a clarification on distributions and clarification of where Pastor Foster's distributions were forwarded after his departure. Krause clarified same for the congregation, including information on scholarships and the Mission Fund. Pastor Foster's contributions were to the Mission Fund; all funds are invested with ELCA Endowment Funds. The committee will be looking at other investment options for review. Pastor Mike reminded the congregation that the Endowment Funds invested through ELCA bless many congregations and mission projects. There were no further questions. Motion/Second to accept the 2015 Endowment Fund Report/motion passed.

Casperson asked for a motion from the congregation to approve the written 2015 Annual Reports from the Finance Committee, Health and Welfare Committee and the Parish Nurse Report. Motion/Second to approve all three reports as submitted, motion passed.

Grace Rossman presented the Call Committee report for 2015. The committee has been convening very regularly. They forwarded one candidate for the pastoral position to the Council for the call, and after several meetings it was determined that the Church could not meet the salary demands of such candidate; as such, the Council rejected the candidate for monetary reasons based on the budget deficit. Rossman discussed the church's strength in the departure of Pastor Foster's retirement, and stated the Call Committee would welcome any suggestions on candidates for a new pastor. Casperson added that there is an increased need for privacy in the call process, which is why no formal reports have been given to date; with the internet and social media, privacy is needed for any candidate that chooses to leave an active position to take the position with Shepherd of the Bay Church.

Treasurer Ron Hupe presented the proposed 2016 Annual Budget for Shepherd of the Bay Church for the congregation's review and approval. He again addressed the 2015 deficit, which was caused be several contributing factors: Pastor Foster's departure and the death of several major annual contributors to the Church. Pledges were also down for 2016; as such, he felt an attainable budget was attempted and presented. One unknown remains the future permanent pastor's salary. Expenses have been cut where they could be cut. Sally Nesser asked about the number of actual member in the Church; Casperson felt the number could be accurately assessed at around 500 members, but only 150-175 pledges come back annually. There are also contributing members to the Church outside the membership. Casperson also stated some members have stated that they will decline pledging until they know there is a new pastor. The decreases in annual pledges and decreased pledges to the Building Fund have been significant. A second pledge mailing will be forthcoming in early 2016. Carol Williams asked for a clarification on the \$24,000.00 under the Missionary Fund; Hupe explained that the number is broken down in the Council reports into several categories. Werner Krause asked for a clarification of the budget debt and asked if the answer is to ask the congregation to "dig a little bit deeper", and asked if there would need to be more cuts as the year progressed. Casperson stated there will be a new Finance Committee for 2016, and there will be more discussion on the budget and the cuts after it is formed. Eloise Lindem asked if there is a category that addresses the actual members that are needed to contribute to any annual Synod payment, and asked if the seasonal members could be contacted for contributions. Hupe clarified that the Synod payments have not changed; Pastor Mike also stated that there used to be a benevolence request from the Synod based the number of members in a congregation but it has not been enforced in several decades. Casperson stated that several major contributors passed away in 2015, including a contributor that had made an annual \$25,000.00 contribution for the past several years. It was clarified that the Synod payment has not changed and is included on the Budget under Outreach/Ministry. Motion by Krause, seconded by Jan Mielke, to accept the 2016 Annual Budget as presented.

New Business: Eloise Lindem asked why the Parish Nurse program had been eliminated for 2016; Casperson explained it was a duplication of services that are already provided in the community and that the Health & Wellness Committee will remain in full force and effect for the congregation should any issues arise, but that the current cut was based on the budget. Casperson also stated that there will be a re-clarification of ALL job descriptions currently on file for Shepherd of the Bay Church, but added that there have been no raises in four years to any of the 9 full or part-time employee of the Church, but there have been years when bonuses were awarded. There will be no raises or bonuses for 2016. It was clarified that the office has a master list of all Council and Committee members, as well as all full and part-time employees of the Church, and members are welcome to contact the Church Office for a copy of same. Dick Burress asked about the possibility of offering direct deposits for contributors to utilize, as it is an easy way to pay bills automatically, and Casperson stated that the possibility will be explored by the Budget Committee in the future, but the Church will continue to utilize the envelope system in the interim. Werner Krause also mentioned that stock can be transferred annually in lieu of direct deposits, having the same impact as a direct deposit system.

President Casperson thanks Lars Larsen and Barb MacDonald, retiring Council members that will remain active with their various committees, for their huge contributions of time and talent to the Council. He also thanked the membership for supporting him during his term of presidency.

Pastor Mike gave a brief speech about his term as "an interim for an interim" (for Interim Pastor Frank Maxwell) and that he has been warmly welcomed into the Church. He has concerns about the deficit, and feels that no further cuts can be made without hurting the quality of the Church, other than "doing without". He feels that Shepherd of the Bay Church and its congregation is a blessing to the community and that the congregation can focus more strongly on donations from the congregation and the community. His main concern is the pastoral salary for the incoming pastor. He feels the salary package is too low to get the experience needed for the Church as well as the experience the congregation wants. He concluded the meeting in prayer for the Church and its members and the Door County community.

Motion/second to adjourn the Annual Meeting for Shepherd of the Bay Church, and the meeting adjourned at 11:22 a.m.

If all of the pieces continue to fall into place, Shepherd of the Bay's next pastor will be leading worship by early spring.

As I have shared with you many times, it was my great honor to serve as your interim pastor . . . it was a delight. Your new pastor will be greeted by a dedicated and faithful congregation. And, yes, with a new pastor comes the possibility of even more new ideas and suggestions and, dare I say, change. The good news is . . . I know that you are up to the challenge.

Shepherd of the Bay is a mission-focused congregation . . . anxiously waiting the arrival of your next pastor. Such things take time. But be of good cheer . . . the time is near.

Sunday School

For the 2016 year, the Sunday School time was changed from 9:15am -10am to 9:00am - approximately 10:30am. This was done to try to find a happy medium between the congregation wanting to see the children in the church service/fellowship more and a desirable time that works for parents. A children's sermon was brought back into the service and I feel it is having a positive impact on the youth. They get to interact with the pastor and get a feeling of belonging. The more engaging the sermon with interactions from the congregation the more the children talk about it.

We have stayed with the Augsburg Fortress curriculum but have switched to a rotational lesson plan which offers more variety in activities for more diverse age groups. We have 2 classrooms. The first classroom is for preschoolers where we follow our Bible story through art, movement, song and snack. The second classroom is for 1st through 6th grade. We do similar activities but add science. There are many articles in Christian faith that say churches lose children from the church by the time they reach the age of 10 due to questions arising in this day of technology, all access to information and science. The children have had questions regarding different religions, science and space, evolution, death, etc. The list goes on and never ceases to amaze me. The rotational program has an excellent science portion that brings belief and faith in God and Jesus to these topics and more.

We have 32 children registered with an average weekly attendance of 13-18 children. The remaining balance of students are intermittent or special programs attendance.

We have: 13 preschoolers 9 1st-3rd grade 10 4-6th graders.

We ended our year performing a Christmas program that Lori Free performed back in 1996. She graciously donated new costumes and props to our christmas program and velvet storyboards for the preschool classrooms.

The teachers for the year are Lynne Buchner and Kristi Nelson Appel. We usually have 5-8 preschoolers and 5 uppers in attendance. A big thank you to our parents who have helped out. They are Amanda Christel, Jeremy and Cindi Schwab, Kit and Elizabeth Butz, Sandy Kopitzke, Marlee Tesnow, Mary Ann Rinkleff and Kristen Demarinis. If I have forgotten anyone know you are VERY much appreciated. We need at LEAST 2 people in the preschool classroom to maintain safety and could use more help. The parents have helped when asked but I am disappointed that the congregation that wants to see the children in church have not given their time to grow the children in their faith.

To date the Sunday School has collected \$35. I would like to continue to vote as a class as to where the money should be donated to in connection with the Guatemala mission trip. I utilized \$1700 of my budget for the year. I was continuing to use up the remnants of supplies we have had that is starting to fade, crumble and go bad from being stored for too many years. It would be nice for the Sunday School Coordinator to have a debit or credit card to be able to order more easily the things needed at the best price. Getting necessities has been limited to places with existing accounts and have not always met the needs.

For 2017 the classrooms have a need to be updated with organizational implements and biblical decoration. We also need all new milestone ministry gifts. We have used them all. This is an exciting time for Sunday School with such a high number of young children, we have a new beginning.

2016 World Marketplace

World Marketplace is still looking for someone to take over this project. In the meantime, Carol Omernick has taken over the ordering of Fair Trade Coffee, Chocolate bars, etc. We offered new seasonal coffees from Guatemala and Haiti. We also featured some of our new coffee blends at the coffee/fellowship hour between services a few times in 2016. Look for more of this in 2017.

With the help of Cindy Schaulis, Haitian artwork was ordered and put on display in the fellowship hall. During November and December we focused on helping the Haitian artists recover from the recent hurricane by selling some of their recycled metal drum and river stone artwork. The church has gathered a number of pieces through SERRV and Comite Artisanl Haitian (CAH). These two organizations provide essential equipment, training, and marketing so low income artisans and farmers can design and create new products and find new markets for their work. Your purchase of their unique artwork is just one small way to help put money directly into the pocket of Haitian artists to help them rebuild their lives.

Even though the World Marketplace is smaller in scale, our main goal is still to help struggling artists around the world.

Guatemala Mission Trip

Guatemala Short term Mission Trip 2016 had 18 participants which is our largest group to date. We had 7 high school students and 11 adults in this year's group. We shared God's love with many families. Six homes were built for Mayan women and children. Another six homes, built in previous years, were restored and painted. Two of the restored homes had an outdoor bathroom added. Water filters and cook stoves were installed for families to improve health and safety as well as to conserve wood, which is costly. We supplied each home, we visited, with an audio bible in their native language.

Our Group participated in food distributions for 50 to 100 widows. Each woman could receive a month's supply of basic food staples. School children were fitted and given shoes made on site. We assisted at evening feeding programs which fed children spiritually as well as physically. There are 3 Program sites which serve hundreds of children meals twice per week.

We prayed, played and shared the gospel. With the support of Congregation, the mission group was able to touch many lives for Christ.

We raised money by staffing water stations at various races in Door County, a booth at Marina Fest in Sister Bay, Lenten Meals, Husby's Fundraiser and donations by SOTB members.
