## So Many Reasons to Give Thanks

### **Garden Club: You Are Awesome**

I know that in these strange times, many reading this newsletter may not have been to the church in quite some time now. So, you may not have noticed how beautiful the grounds of the church are. If you have been to church, for drive-in or something else, you have seen how gorgeous the entire property is. So, here's a shout out to all you in the Thursday morning Garden Club. You know who you are! You make our grounds beautiful, not to mention the thousands of dollars you save us every year, thousands that we don't have to pay to a lawn service, thousands that are then freed up to dedicate to the important ministry of the Gospel. Thanks to all of you!

### **Exterior Project Completed**

Though it's old news that the work on the exterior of the building is completed, I want to bring it up for a couple of reasons. As you know, the siding was completely replaced, and a new roof was added. The quality of both the materials and the workmanship was top of the line, and the hope is that those parts of the building won't have to be addressed for another 50 years, significantly longer than the 30 years of the original estimate. In addition, the donor family offered to cover the cost of adding insulation while the siding was off. Though the building design prohibited adding as much insulation as we might have wished, the added insulation will certainly save us money on heating and cooling costs.

I'm sure you remember that it was just over a year ago at the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration that I announced the gift from an anonymous donor family that would cover the cost of the building maintenance. A year later, as the project is now complete, we say yet another word of thanks for their faithfulness and generosity.

### **Thank you, Tom**

And apparently, I'm still on the subject of gratitude. While the ministry of any congregation relies on hundreds of faithful volunteers – and Shepherd of the Bay is no exception – there are often a few who by virtue of their generous gifts of time and expertise are worth acknowledging publicly. Tom Tuttle is one of those people and I want to take this very public space to offer a very public word of thanks. Tom has been integral to the installation and smooth operation of our new sound and projection system. He is in the sanctuary every Thursday morning to assist with taping the service, and then edits the recording so that it's ready to upload to our YouTube channel. Tom chairs the Building and Grounds Committee and has carefully and faithfully addressed so many issues in the building. Thanks to his leadership and the hours that so many volunteers have put in, our building is in better shape now than it has been for some time. Tom is the one who is the first one to show up when something is broken or when there is a building emergency of some kind. Tom has also been the first one to show up on Sunday mornings to help set up for Drive-in Church. Finally, (and it's not really "finally" because there are so many things he does that I haven't mentioned!!), Tom served as the congregational representative and spokesperson for the siding and roofing project. From helping to choose the contractor to making sure we chose the right materials, to making sure the contractors were accountable to deliver the work they promised, Tom walked us through that project every step of the way. Tom, thank you! And thank you also to your entire Building and Grounds Committee and the many volunteers you enlisted to help care for our building.

### **Parish Nurse Task Force, We Appreciate You**

The Parish Health and Wellness Task Force has completed their work, setting us up to accomplish our goal of bringing a Faith Community Nurse onto our staff in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of this year. They were assigned the responsibility of defining what that ministry would look like at Shepherd of the Bay and defining how a Faith Community Nurse would fit into that ministry. They will turn in their report to the council and the council will then move forward to launch our Ministry of Health and Wellness. Thank you to Mark Glasser who provided excellent leadership to the team, and to team members Tim West, Mickey Swanson, Julie Rogers, and Dave Boock. Great work!

## **Parking Lot Ushers, You Are Amazing!**

I will confess that the Drive-in Church has exceeded my paltry expectations (oh ye of little faith. Pr. Jim, I'm looking at you!). # Lessons for August

## **August 2: Ninth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Isaiah 55:1-5

Second Lesson: Romans 9:1-5

Holy Gospel: Matthew 14: 13-21

**Introduction to the readings:** In today's first reading God invites all who are hungry or thirsty to receive food and drink without cost. Jesus feeds the hungry multitude and reveals the abundance of God. At the eucharistic table we remember all who are hungry or poor in our world today. As we share the bread of life, we are sent forth to give ourselves away as bread for the hungry.

## **August 9 : Tenth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: 1 Kings 19:9-18

Second Lesson: Romans 10:5-15

Holy Gospel: Matthew 14: 22-33

**Introduction to the readings:** Elijah finds the presence of God not in earthquake, wind, or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence. When the disciples face a great storm on the sea, they cry out with fear. Jesus says: "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Amid the storms of life, we gather to seek the calm presence of Christ that soothes our fears. In comforting words of scripture and in the refreshing bread and cup of the eucharist, God grants us peace and sends us forth to be a sign of God's presence to others.

## **August 16 : Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Isaiah 56:1, 6-8

Second Lesson: Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32

Holy Gospel: Matthew 15: 21-88

**Introduction to the readings:** In Isaiah we hear that God's house shall be a house of prayer for all people and that God will gather the outcasts of Israel. The Canaanite woman in today's gospel is a Gentile, an outsider, who is unflinching in her request that Jesus heal her daughter. As Jesus commends her bold faith, how might our church extend its mission to those on the margins of society? In our gathering around word and meal we receive strength to be signs of comfort, healing, and justice for those in need.

## **August 23 : Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Isaiah 51:1-6

Second Lesson: Romans 12:1-8

Holy Gospel: Matthew 16:13-20

**Introduction to the readings:** In Isaiah the people are advised to look to their spiritual ancestors as the rock from which they were hewn. Jesus declares that the church will be built on the rock of Peter's bold confession of faith. God's word of reconciliation and God's mercy are keys to the church's mission. Paul urges us to not be conformed to this world but to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, using our individual gifts to build up the body of Christ. From the table we go forth to offer our spiritual worship through word and deed.

## **August 30 : Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Jeremiah 15:15-21

Second Lesson: Romans 12:9-21

Holy Gospel: Matthew 16:21-28

**Introduction to the readings:** The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

It occurs to me that this health journey that we have traveled for these past few months has felt like *wandering in the dark* in many respects. Every corner of our lives has been affected by the “new normal” rules of engagement: wear your mask, maintain a safe physical distance, wash your hands regularly and stay at home as much as possible. These significant and important aspects of responsible living under the cloud of coronavirus have been a good reminder of what it means to be a good neighbor to our friends in the community-at-large and a loving son or daughter within our own church family. Although the road in front of us, a road less traveled, so to speak (*"The Road Not Taken" is a poem by Robert Frost, published in 1916 as the first poem in the collection Mountain Interval. Its central theme is the divergence of paths, both literally and figuratively, although its interpretation is noted for being complex and potentially divergent. Wikipedia*), is dark and somewhat unfamiliar to us, it offers us the opportunity to follow the stream of light that God shines to illuminate our path forward.

So how does this affect our musical life in the church? How do these new rules impact the choices we make as singers, instrumentalists and music-lovers? We understand that care must be exercised with our every inhalation and exhalation in the expression of speech, song, laughter, joy, tears, celebration, worship. The inhibitions to our “normal” way of expressing ourselves in worship these days seem like running across big boulders in our road. The question is: do we stop moving forward because there are boulders in the road? or do we seek a new path around the obstacles in front of us? I prefer to seek an alternate route and keep moving forward!

Many of our Sanctuary Choir members have followed this new path of possibilities as they have volunteered to sing for the recorded worship services found on our [shepherdofthebay.org](http://shepherdofthebay.org) website on Sunday mornings. These singers represent the congregation in the sanctuary, safely distanced from each other, offering encouragement to those listening at home through their singing and their presence in all aspects of the service, both spoken and sung. These wonderful singers have recognized this new illuminated path and have chosen to follow it, for the benefit of all of us. Thank you to every one of them!

Another terrific path has been revealed to our church community. We can worship together again! Side by side, sitting in front and behind each other, in the sunshine and in the rain, always abiding by the health rules established for us. We can sing together ... apart! We can hear the word preached ... together and apart! We can receive communion again ... together and apart! We can *honk for Jesus!* ... apart and together! We can celebrate our young confirmands ... together and apart! I am speaking of Drive-in Church on Sunday mornings at 9:30, which I believe God has illuminated as a new path forward in our church life. Shepherd of the Bay, though the building is mostly closed at this moment, is alive and well and JOYFULLY NOISY in this new worship format! God continues to lead us forward by shining a new and wonderful light on this new path.

***Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness.***

***Christ, be our light! Shine in your church gathered today.***

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see. *Refrain*

Longing for peace, our world is troubled. Longing for hope, many despair.

Your word alone has power to save us. Make us your living voice. *Refrain*

Longing for food, many are hungry. Longing for water, many still thirst.

Make us your bread, broken for others, shared until all are fed. *Refrain*

Longing for shelter, many are homeless. Longing for warmth, many are cold.

Make us your building, sheltering others, walls made of living stone. *Refrain*

Many the gifts, many the people, many the hearts that yearn to belong.

Let us be servants to one another, signs of your kingdom come.

***Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness.***

***Christ, be our light! Shine in your church gathered today.***

May we continue to move forward in our worship life at Shepherd of the Bay, singing songs of praise and thanksgiving, making a jubilant sound with voices and instruments and car horns, following the path forward that God is illuminating for all of us. God is leading us out of the darkness of this moment and into the light of a new beginning. Thanks be to God. Amen.

## **Building and Grounds Committee**

If none of us are around, drop a note in the message holder on the custodian's closet door in the narthex (the door between the 2 restrooms). Thank you for using the message holder and helping to identify things that need to be done.

### **Projects**

•**Roof** – The new roof is finished and the new “bird wire” has been installed on every peak. It looks really good and has much more visual and actual depth than the old roof. The recent heavy rains washed off most of the evidence that the sea gulls found the new roof before the “bird wire” was installed. **Note:** *Checkout the church website “What’s New” for more photos.*



•**Interior LED Lights** – The new LED Flat Panel lights have been ordered and will be delivered July 29th. There are 123 light fixtures on 3 pallets which will be stored in a corner of the Fellowship Hall. This will be enough to replace all the remaining florescent tube fixtures in the Fellowship Hall, Offices, Conference Room, Choir Room and rear entrance restrooms. Due to the available rebates for converting to the new energy efficient lighting we were able to stretch the donor's gift to include new lights for the large Sunday School room at the top of the stairs and all the lights for the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor hallway. Building and Grounds will be installing all these new fixtures, so if you have electrical experience and would like to help please contact Tom Tuttle. If you are not comfortable dealing with electricity and would like to help carry old fixtures out contact Tom Tuttle.

•**Exterior LED Lights** – Will be looking for a new supplier specializing in exterior lighting.

•**Sanctuary Dimmers** – This project has been put on hold due to the financial uncertainty of the COVID19 outbreak.

## Building Maintenance

•**Front Entrance Vestibule Window** – The left-hand window next to the bench was broken earlier this year when the crew was installing the new siding. Admittedly, it did not get ordered as soon as it should have, but now has been and will be installed as soon as it is available.

•**COVID19 Response** – Six new touchless hand sanitizing stations were delivered and located throughout the building.

**Garden Club** – New volunteers are always welcome! Join the Garden Club on Thursday mornings from 8:30-10.

**Poison Ivy Alert** – The southeast corner of the property from Humbug Road west along the southern property line up to the parking lot is loaded with poison ivy. As a result, the walking path in that area is not being mowed. The Garden Club has started spraying to eradicate the problem, but it is going to take all summer.

We discussed having a discreet sign or logo that all those in the coalition could use as a signal to folks looking for a food pantries. We decided that the upright banner/flag was too gaudy and settled on asking the coalition to come up with the logo.

Although there is presently a plaque attached to the large bell on the church grounds, the family feels that not many people see this and they would like a plaque inside the church lobby. However, it was brought to our attention that it is not allowed according to the church by-laws. We are considering bringing the bell closer to the entrance so that it is more visible to onlookers and when the time is right, we will hold a service in honor of Russell and Virginia, post covid 19.


## Klaud's Food Pantry


Thank you to all who have so generously contributed to the Pantry since it's beginning. The need is very great at this time, and Klaud would be so happy to know people are being fed in her memory.
